### "SUFFER FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS' SAKE"

### INTRODUCTION

- I. The world is FULL of "suffering."
  - A. Suffering in the world is the result of SIN, directly or indirectly.
    - 1. When Adam and Eve sinned in Eden, they opened the door to human suffering.
      - a. Virtually every human being will suffer in some form while upon earth.
      - b. The word "suffer" suggests **pain**, and all who suffer pain need encouragement.
    - 2. God is not the author of pain and suffering, but Satan is it 's author.
      - a. Some turn against God because suffering exists in the world, saying "God allows it."
      - b. God knows that suffering exists, and He HAS done something about it, as He put in motion a plan to END all suffering, for those who follow His plan.
      - c. That plan is to bring the righteous to heaven where suffering will not exist. Rev. 21:4
  - B. The apostle Peter wrote a lot about human suffering. (Read 1 Pet. 3:13-22) The title of our lesson is "Suffer For Righteousness' Sake" which comes from verse 14 of this reading, as Peter said, "Suffer For Righteousness' sake."
- II. Now, let's examine these verses more closely.

#### **DISCUSSION**

## I. 1st, we MAY SUFFER FOR DOING GOOD.

- A. Christ suffered for doing good, and if WE do good, we partake of His sufferings. vs. 13- 14; 4:13
  - 1. When WE suffer for righteousness' sake, we know that we need not fear, for it is only temporary. Matt. 10:28; 5:10-12
  - 2. We can sanctify God in our hearts and demonstrate why we can endure suffering. 1 Pet. 3:13-15
- B. God's will is that **IF** we are going to suffer, let it be for <u>good</u> rather than <u>evil</u>, for such will be ultimately be worthwhile. vs. 16-17
  - 1. Some suffering comes because of physical pain, or causes that come upon them because of varied circumstances in life.
  - 2. Then some suffering is a result of involvement in sin. 1 Pet. 4:15
  - 3. It is better to suffer for good, because we are Christians. v. 16
  - 4. The final result of proper suffering is "shame" for accusers, and "glory" for the "accused." 3:16; 4:13

# II. 2<sup>nd</sup>, for our benefit, we have the EXAMPLE OF CHRIST.

- A. Christ inspires us through His supreme example of suffering. 3:18; cf Matt. 16:21; Luke 24:46; Heb. 5:7-9
  - 1. Now let's analyze 1 Pet. 4:18, as Peter gives details of Christ's suffering.
    - a. Christ suffered only "once," for He will never have to do it again. (text)
    - b. He suffered "for sins" because of man's sins, and as a "sin offering", to enable man to end his suffering by following Christ's example. (text)
    - c. Jesus suffered as the "just for the unjust." (text) cf Rom. 5:6
    - d. Jesus suffered to "bring us to God." (text)
    - e. Jesus was "put to death" on the cruel cross. (text)
    - f. Jesus' suffering ENDED by His being "quickened" or made alive by the Spirit when He was raised from the dead. (text). Cf Rom. 1:4
  - 2. Since the Spirit was active in Jesus' resurrection, Peter goes on to describe another function of the Spirit that occurred centuries before. 1 Pet. 3:19

- B. Peter says "by which also" (referring to the Spirit which raised Him from the dead) "he went and preached" to certain people.
  - 1. When did this occur?
    - a. Some believe that Jesus preached to the lost souls in Hades during the 3 days He was in Hades before His resurrection.
    - b. IF so, what good would it have done—could they NOW repent and be saved?
      - 1) Would not this be a "second chance after death?" cf Heb. 9:27
      - 2) Peter states that they were *"reserved unto judgment,"* and NOT reserved for a second chance. Cf 2 Pet. 2:4-5
  - 2. This **preaching** appears to be **TO** people who were alive when the preaching occurred, who are **NOW** "imprisoned in Hades."
  - 3. The text tells us "when" the preaching took place, "IN the days of Noah." 1 Pet. 3:20; cf Gen. 6:1-3
    - a. The text says "he went"--it was the Holy Spirit striving with man to repent, in the words Noah proclaimed.
    - b. The spirits "were" alive when the preaching occurred, but are NOW in prison.
    - c. Before they were "spirits" in prison, they were **fully human** (body and soul) **"in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing."** cf 4:5-6 (an *example* of how preaching took place to people who were alive but now dead).

### CONCLUSION

- I. The final result of proper suffering will be "shame" for the persecutors, but "joy" and "glory" for the persecuted, which is incentive for people in **ANY AGE** who are in any way persecuted because of their faith in an unbelieving world.
  - A. For this reason, it is good to suffer (if need be) according to the will of God. Matt. 5:12
  - B. A hymn we sometimes hear and sing is entitled "READY".

    "Pandy to suffer grief or pain, Ready to stand the test: Ready to s
  - "Ready to suffer grief or pain, Ready to stand the test; Ready to stay at home and send others if He sees best. Ready to speak, ready to warn, Ready o'er souls to yearn; Ready in life, Ready in death, Ready for His return."
- II. Being ready to suffer for the Lord involves a deep faith and faithfulness to God as one who has confessed faith in Jesus and put Him on in baptism for the remission of sins.

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
